I attended the Spring Regional Training for Fulbright Liaisons from April 14-16 at the University of Minnesota in Minneapolis, in order to gain knowledge about the various programs and initiatives offered by the Council of International Education Services (CIES), the implementing federal entity for the Fulbright Program; and to network with fellow liaisons from various campuses across the country to learn about their probable replication at GCC. The Fulbright Program is a great way for GCC to internationalize our campus, which is of course one of our Institutional Strategic Master Plan goals. Although most of the 23 participants at the conference were from 4-year colleges, a colleague from Hawaii Community College (HCC) at the training shared a lot of examples regarding the HCC Fulbright experience within the past year.

We can integrate several Fulbright ideas into GCC's internationalization efforts in the coming academic year, namely, the Fulbright Ambassador program, which allows designated US visiting scholars to provide a lecture on campus (with all expenses shouldered by Fulbright, and with 2-6 days duration); and the Outreach Lecture Fund, which allows designated non-US visiting scholars to deliver a campus lecture (also at Fulbright's full expense). The Outreach Lecture Fund could benefit the internationalization of our campus through the curriculum, and benefit the community at large through partnerships with nonprofit organizations and community-based organizations.

Also, Fulbright has revamped its scholar program website, with a lot of downloadable resources available for us to start building international connections that benefit both faculty and students through the Fulbright visiting scholar program.
