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# THE SECRET TO HEALTHY LIVING?

Respect Your Mind-Body Relationship

Simply recognizing the intimate relationship between the human body and mind goes a long way in successful treatment and preventative health care.

For instance, scientific research shows that a positive, self-empowering mindset not only greatly impacts how we feel, but also the way we move and how we live our daily lives. In turn, negative, self-limiting thoughts can be both mentally and physically crippling.

**Exercise** has been proven to nurture and strengthen both our mental and physical health. Scientific studies have shown that for those suffering from depression, exercise is an effective long-term alternative to medicine. Even if you aren't suffering from depression, exercise releases endorphins, which elevate our mood. The better you feel, the more likely you are to keep physically active.
