SPRING 2012 ENROLLMENT STILL AT RECORD LEVEL

Spring enrollment up another 5 percent

Students continue to have confidence in the education and training they are receiving at GCC, with 2,463 registering for spring semester postsecondary classes. That number represents a five percent increase over the spring 2011, and another record enrollment at the College. Dr. Mary Okada, GCC president, says it is obvious that students are pleased with the improved learning environment and the quality of the education they are receiving at GCC.

"The opening of the Student Center in December 2011 as our third new building on campus, combined with new programs such as Pre-Architectural Drafting and Civil Engineering Technology, send the message that GCC is progressive with regard to the knowledge and training that our students need to compete for jobs in our increasingly technological workforce," said Okada.

After a 38 percent increase in enrollment from 2007 to 2011, the College is pleased that enrollment is holding steady at this high mark.

When GCC brought former and current chair of an ACCJC accrediting team Dr. Douglas Houston to the College to review our Institutional Self Evaluation Report (ISER) last October, we learned quite a lot from that mock visit. Dr. Houston met with all four Standard Committee chairs and some of their members and had some very constructive suggestions about our Actionable Improvement Plans, or AIPs. He observed for example that we had too many AIPs in the first draft of our report. He reminded us that the commission will hold us accountable for actually implementing all of those strategies! You will be glad to know the four Standard committees have consolidated and whittled those AIPs down to a manageable number: 25. Please take a moment to click on the ACCREDITATION 2012 link on the front page of our web site. The entire Institutional Self Evaluation Report is broken down into segments on the far right. Click on the "Summary of Actionable Improvement Plans" link 4th from the bottom. There, you will find what we say we



need to work on. For example, in Standard II, which is Student Learning Programs and Services, we have 10 AIPs – the most in any of our standards. This makes sense, because our students and what they learn is our main focus. The first AIP is: Increase compliance rate of curriculum revision process to ensure courses and programs are not over five years old, hence remaining current with community and industry standards. This AIP is fairly self-explanatory – it is essential that we review our curriculum often and on a timely basis to keep up with industry. I am counting on all of you to perform your designated roles to the best of your abilities. GCC functions well because we all do a great job at our individual responsibilities. Because of that, I am sure that the outcome of this upcoming visit will be a positive one that benefits our students and the community. We are all in this together, and we need everyone's help to make GCC a Growing, Changing, Challenging institution!

"People love, this campus."



Cuthbert project assists Chuuk schools

As of Jan. 25, students at WeiPat High School on Namonuito Atoll in Chuuk have a fully functioning computer lab, thanks to a partnership between GCC and the Cuthbert Project, a non-profit organization dedicated to helping build capacity and increase opportunities for students in Chuuk, Federated States of Micronesia. The partnership is funded by an \$85,874 grant from the Department of the Interior, and will provide essential developmental English language skills and supplement Chuuk's efforts to establish the necessary infrastructure to provide educational opportunities to students. GCC is the grant fiscal agent. Materials purchased or donated on Guam allowed project coordinators to convert an abandoned classroom into a fully functioning computer lab for the high school's 200 students. Power for the computer lab is being furnish by a large photovoltaic solar array installed several years ago by the European Union.

CE kicks off Project HATSA

Work readiness training was on the agenda for 17 people enrolled in the initial cohort of Project HATSA (Helping Achieve TANF Success through Actions). The federally funded grant project being conducted by GCC and the Guam Department of Public Health & Social Services started Jan. 30, with the goal being to provide clients enrolled in Public Health's Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) program with skills they can use to become gainfully employed.

"The beginning of a month in the traditional Chamorro calendar is marked by the appearance of a star belonging to a particular group at about forty-five degrees above the horizon just before dawn in the east. The year starts with the rising of Antares and ends with the Corona Borealis. Because different constellations occupy a greater or lesser part of the sky, the months are not of uniform length. Ancient Chamorro petro glyphs can also be found in several places on the island of Guam. The most well known cave drawing is at Gadao's Cave in the southern village of Inarajan. The sketches show human figures, animals, sea creatures and weapons. The colors are white, brown and black." (Murphy, Shannon, Guampedia.com).
