Mayor Robert Hoffman has 21 residents lined up to participate in the program, created by the Guam Contractor's Association, the Guam Chamber of Commerce, GCC and the Mayor's Council. Beware of Monster drinks!

Pros and Cons of Drinking Monster Energy Drinks

During the cross-enrolled GWHS orientation, some students asked about Monster energy drinks. This information is important for everyone to know. Energy Drinks are a \$3.5 billion dollar industry in the U.S.A. In today's fast-paced society, many are using energy drinks just to keep up with their everyday demands. The Monster energy drink is a type of energy drink that was created in 2002.

The pros of energy drinks are increased performance and energy. The cons include insomnia, problems concerning blood pressure, heart rate and heart palpitations. Monster energy drinks can have dangerous side effects if combined with alcohol.

Components of energy drinks:

Caffeine – energy drinks contain more caffeine than a cup of coffee. Due to this, our body does not have time to process it properly. As a result, you will likely experience insomnia, nervousness, irritability, and an increase in heart rate and blood pressure.
