



What is a Nontraditional Career?

A nontraditional career refers to an occupation where one gender comprises less than 25% of those employed.

Why does America need nontraditional workers? Nontraditional workers can make up for anticipated labor shortages in various fields, such as science, technology, engineering, and health-care. Nontraditional workers can also bring diverse insights to the workplace. Choosing to pursue a career that is nontraditional is not an easy decision for many individuals due to several stereotypes about "men's work and women's work." For example, some stereotypes for women's work

are "Women don't have the physical strength to do certain jobs," and "Many careers demand total commitment and having a family is not an option." The reality is that although the male body is usually better at building muscle, many women are very fit. Brute strength is losing importance on the job and work tasks can be reorganized for female strength. Not all women intend to start a family and mothers don't carry all childrearing responsibilities. Other stereotypes for women's work are, "Women aren't tough enough for leadership positions," and "Women in this career are taking away jobs from men who need to support their family." The truth is not all women have the same personality type and many women are able to handle highly stressful situations. Low stress job niches are also available. Some

companies classify homemaking as managerial experience. In many families, the earnings of both parents is essential. Another stereotype is "Women aren't good at math." Studies show that young girls and boys have equal math ability. Many women have excelled in math and science careers. (continued on page 2)

collaborate," and "If a career doesn't pay much, men are not likely to stay long." The truth is that not all men have the same personality type and men often face discrimination in

nontraditional jobs. Teamwork is respected in many sports that men play, so many are able

to cooperate and collaborate. The main breadwinner in a family is not always male and some men seek rewards from work other than pay.
