Adult Education Service Inquiry [1]

English as a Second Language (ESL) is for students whose native and/or first language is other than English. This is a program of instruction (A) designed to help eligible individuals who are English language learners achieve competency in reading, writing, speaking, and comprehension of the English language; and (B) that leads to -- (i)(I) attainment of a secondary school diploma or its recognized equivalent; and (II) transition to postsecondary education and training; or (ii) employment.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE ACQUISITION LEARNER / ACTIVITIES

English as a Second Language (ESL) courses is designed to assist students who need to develop and improve their reading, writing, and speaking and listening skills. Students' assessment scores are determined through the Comprehensive Adult Student Assessment System (CASAS) for Adult Education. All ESL courses are aligned with the English Language Proficiency Standards (ELPS) for Adult Education. According to WIOA, English language acquisition programs should be designed to support English Language Learners (ELLs) in becoming skilled in reading, writing, speaking, and comprehension of English. English language acquisition programs must also help ELLs obtain a high school diploma or its recognized equivalent and support them as they move toward further education, training, or employment.
