(Provides thoughtfully organized experiences that integrate students' academic learning with a service that meets actual community needs)

5 Components of Service Learning

- Identify community need: What needs to be done?
- **Identify community organization to be serviced:** What school, church, mayor's office, or non-profit organization can be serviced?
- Identify the service: What service will be completed?
- Tie to curriculum: How is the service related to what is being learned in the classroom?
- Reflect and create a written paper: What did I do? How did I do? Now what can I do?
