



### 1ST CONSTRUCTION BOOT CAMP SUCCESSFUL

GCC and island construction employers celebrated the completion by 33 participants of GCC's Future Builders of Guam Construction Boot Camp on Aug. 28 in the GCC Learning Resource Center. GCC offered the free construction boot camp from July 2 through August 10 in order to address the critical shortage of construction workers on island. Several employers have hired some of the completers, two of whom scored platinum (the highest possible) on the National Career Readiness Certificate exam. The completers will also take the NOCTI (National Occupational Competency Testing Institute) certification exam. NOCTI is the largest provider of industry-based credentials and partner industry certifications for career and technical education (CTE) programs across the nation.

The camp focused on the construction fields of carpentry, welding, electrical, masonry, and plumbing. Participants also earned valuable CPR/Basic First Aid, OSHA safety and EM385-1-1 (compliance required by all contractors working on military contracts and projects) certifications.

Another free construction boot camp is planned for summer 2019.





### Early Middle College launches with student-parent orientation

GCC launched a pilot cohort of its Early Middle College initiative with 18 students from George Washington High School and their parents or guardians in the GCC AALG Allied Health Center Lecture Hall 3120 on Aug. 31. Hernalin Analista, GWHS Career Counselor; Rick Tyquiengco, GCC Technology instructor; and Trisha Unten, TPS Associate Dean, explained how the students would take a college course at GCC after high school hours, and that course, if the students pass with a "B" or better, will count toward their postsecondary degree in Construction Trades once they graduate from high school and declare Construction Trades as their major at GCC.

"It was a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity, and my parents told me they weren't offered this type of opportunity," said 15-year-old Tyson Elameto, who signed up with his mother, Angelynn Elameto, and Hernalin Analista, the GCC career counselor at George Washington High School, where Tyson is a freshman.





#### Legislative Resolution for GCC's 7-year accreditation

Sen. Joe S. San Agustin, chair of the Committee on Education, Finance, and Taxation, and Sen. Wil Castro presented Dr. Mary Okada, GCC President/CEO, and Frank Arriola, Chairman of the GCC Board of Trustees, with a legislative resolution commending Guam Community College for its accreditation status on July 3. GCC was awarded full seven-year accreditation – the longest period possible for a community college – by the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC) of the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC), on June 13, 2018. The ACCJC peer review team gave GCC four commendations signifying that the institution has exceeded standards, including commendations for its (now 17) consecutive clean audits and for initiatives that support student learning.

#### **CLYMER RESULTS PROMISING**

First year assessment results of GCC's CLYMER, or "Classroom Learning Yields Math & English Readiness" program show promise for those students, and indicate solid instruction in math and English at the precollege level, according to GCC officials. Dr. Michael Chan, Dean of Technology & Student Services at GCC, reports that the overall success rate of CLYMER students enrolled in EN110 for AY2017-2018 was 94%, with 118 students out of 126 successfully completing EN110 with a grade of a "C" or better. The overall success rate of CLYMER students who enrolled directly into MA110 for AY2017-2018 was 95%, with 74 students out of 78 successfully completing MA110 with a grade of a "C" or better. High School students with a "B" or better in senior math and/or English courses can enroll directly into MA110 or EN110 through CLYMER.



### GPA APPRENTICESHIP GRADUATION

Just in time for typhoon season, 15 proud young men completed the GCC Apprenticeship program as load dispatchers, line installer-repairers, electricians, powerhouse mechanics, and one as an arc welder for the Guam Power Authority on July 13 at the GPA/GWA complex at Fadian. The men celebrated with their families and fellow GPA employees and GCC officials. Hopefully, their skills will be put to use conducting normal GPA operations, and not storm recovery!

#### CRIMINAL JUSTICE ACADEMY COMPLETION

Twenty-six men and women completed the 16th Criminal Justice Academy at GCC on July 14 at the Sheraton Laguna Resort. With their class motto as "Duty to Protect; Honor to Serve," the class commander, Cadet Paul Palmer encouraged his fellow students to complete their Criminal Justice associate degree at GCC and to be proud to serve the people of Guam. GPD Capt. Paul Sayama served as the 16th cycle cadre.





#### Korean Exchange Program

July 16 - 27 in Korea; July 30 - Aug. 24 on Guam

Six GCC students spent two weeks at Baekseok University in Korea in July as part of GCC's Korean Language and Culture summer course, and then welcomed their Korean counterparts to Guam on Tuesday, July 31st, for the ESL Immersion portion of the program between GCC and Baekseok, a private university. Located in Cheonan City, South Korea, Baekseok has an enrollment of approximately 15,000 students and a thriving hotel management program with which GCC has partnered for the college's Associate of Science degree in International Hotel Management. The 12 students from Baekseok spent four weeks on Guam, studying English at GCC and experiencing the warm hospitality and vitality of the island's Chamorro culture.





Jae-Hwan Baek, a 24-year-old hotel management major at Baekseok, said he is taking part in the program "to learn English and the culture and visit my friends from Guam." Baek noted that he has good memories of two weeks he spent with the students from Guam at Baekseok, and he hopes to learn with them here.

Licina Ruecho, a GCC Tourism & Travel Management major, was one of the students that traveled to Baekseok as part of a four-credit course that immersed them in the Korean culture and provided them with the opportunity to learn and speak Korean. "It was amazing. Their school is so big and they're so advanced. We learned taekwondo, and we took the subway – we don't have those on Guam," said Ruecho. "Their dorms are so tall – they have like 800 rooms. I was in awe," she said.



## FROM THE PRESIDENT

In addition to welcoming over 2,100 students to campus for the first week of classes this August, GCC also completed one important initiative and started another. Our Construction Boot Camp, which started out in July, finished up six weeks later on August 10. On the 28th, we had a ceremony for the completers, nearly a dozen of whom have already found jobs in the industry. Then on Aug. 31st, we welcomed 18 GWHS students and their parents or guardians to campus to invite them to sign up for our pilot "Early Middle College" initiative. This initiative will eventually allow Guam high school students to graduate from high school with a postsecondary GCC Construction Trades certificate, provided they meet all of the requirements. This first cohort of students will be able to graduate with six credits toward that Construction Trades certificate program. Several of their parents who encouraged them to sign up did so because they were GCC Voc Tech High School graduates several decades ago, and they appreciate that GCC is giving their children this type of opportunity. I had the opportunity to talk to members of the Guam Chamber of Commerce about our EMC initiative at their monthly meeting on Aug. 29 at the Sheraton Laguna Resort, and it was very well received. This is great news with regard to business partnerships for our Early Middle College, and can lead to more students graduating from high school with employable credentials and securing sustainable jobs in our workforce.

Congratulations to our 16th Criminal Justice cycle graduates – we want to see all of you back on campus to finish up your CJ associate degrees! Also, congratulations to the 15 young men who completed our Apprenticeship program with GPA in August. Their training is coming in handy for all of us this typhoon season – great job, gentlemen. We have a busy semester to look forward to, with student gubernatorial and senatorial forums and a lot of other program activities. We also welcome the Lt. Governor's First Year Free initiative, which is giving dozens of people the opportunity to complete one year of our Culinary Arts or Tourism & Travel Management associate degree program for FREE. ## FROM THE ALO'S DESK

Welcome back to campus, everyone. Our Convocation theme this year is "Beyond Accreditation: Strategic Thinking for 2025." Now that we have been successful in the reaffirmation of our accreditation, we need to view the College from a holistic perspective. What will GCC look like in 2025, given the changes that are drastically occurring in our environment at the program, state, and federal levels?

How do we deal with all these changes? We have to compete to attract more students to attend GCC. We need to think of strategic ways to make our product unique and special so that we can do what I would like to call, "creative selling" or "innovative marketing."

Our total Fall enrollment has dropped 18% since Fall 2015. Our secondary enrollment also dipped last school year from the previous one. How can we all work together to stabilize our enrollment, both at the secondary and postsecondary levels? We have a large number of students in the secondary programs that earn Certificates of Mastery each school year, but only a meager number apply for college credits through our DCAPS process. The deans, counselors, and faculty will be working together and collaborate to tap into this Certificate of Mastery pool so that it becomes a viable source of prospective postsecondary students. We also need to do a better job in tracking and monitoring these students as they transition from secondary to postsecondary so that we are certain that this is a viable pathway for them.

We also need to re-assert our leadership in CTE on Guam and the entire Micronesian region. Our Future Builders Construction Boot Camp this summer is one model we can expand on, in order to ensure that the training our students receive is not only fast tracked but also leads to employment. Also, we are planning a CTE Regional Summit at GCC on February 22-23, 2019. The Deans will be working with the Department Chairs to plan student-centered activities at the department level that will align with CTE month and with this summit.

One of the new initiatives that will move student completion into the forefront is our Early Middle College program. This program will provide an excellent opportunity for our students to complete a high school diploma and a college credential at the same time. This I call strategic thinking at its best. Stay tuned, we have a lot of planning to accomplish in the coming years!
