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From the President...

For spring semester 2013, our registrar Patrick Clymer tells me we have 2,428 students - just 54 students less than spring semester last year. Patrick points out that when you look at the past six academic years, the average fall enrollment for the last three fall terms (AY2010-2011 to AY2012-2013) is over 27% more than the average of the three previous fall terms (AY2007-2008 to AY2009-2010). That's some amazing growth! To think that we have grown that much, put up four new buildings and added programs, all while our budget has been cut, is a testament to the dedication of the faculty, staff, and administrators here at GCC. We are quite a team, and I am grateful for all the work that you do. Kudos to the Bank of Guam and Nikko Hotel for their donations to our postsecondary service learning and secondary HTMP programs this month. These partnerships are so valuable to us because of our budgetary challenges. Also, congratulations to Dean Reilly on the 30th anniversary of his textbook, Pacific Nations & Territories, which is still teaching our island's youth about Guam and our region.

30th anniversary of Dean Reilly's PNT textbook!

January 21st marked the 30th anniversary of the release of Reilly Ridgell's textbook, Pacific Nations and Territories, The Islands of Micronesia, Melanesia, and Polynesia. Ridgell, then an assistant professor and now Dean of Trades and Professional Services, wrote the book in 1983 to fill a void in teaching materials about Pacific Islands. GCC funded publication of the first edition in paperback. Since then, the book has been continuously in print, with the second, third, and fourth editions having been published in hardback by Bess Press of Hawaii. A fifth edition is in the planning stages. The book is in use on Guam, in Hawaii, and on many other Pacific islands.

"The success of this book has fulfilled and exceeded my expectations," Ridgell said. "To be 30 years from its initial release and still be a viable, useful tool for Pacific educators is very gratifying. Many people helped me with this project but I need to particularly give kudos to Dr. John Salas, Provost of GCC in 1983, and the GCC Board of Trustees."

Continuing Ed launched the first of 19 Community Access Points on Jan. 11 at the Inarajan Mayor's Office. The CAPs are a partnership between GCC, the Guam Contractor's Association, the Guam Chamber of Commerce and the Mayor's Council of Guam, through which residents will have access to free online training via the KeyTrain component of WorkKeys. The six-week CAPS program offers residents the opportunity to spend six to 10 hours a week working on online skills development, and in turn, they will spend two hours a week working on a village beautification project. Once they complete the KeyTrain program, residents can then take the test to earn a National Career Readiness Certificate offered through WorkKeys.

Allied Health offers NCLEX-PN review

The Allied Health Department offered an NCLEX-PN review course for recent graduates of the Practical Nursing program and any one else wanting to take the NCLEX-PN Examination from Jan. 22 - 31, to help prepare students to take the NCLEX-PN Examination with the Guam Board of Nursing Examiners.
