Enrollment for fall semester 2012 at GCC is at 2,546 students - only 10 fewer (less than a one percent decrease) than Fall 2011's all-time high of 2,556 students. The fall 2012 enrollment number includes 906 new freshmen, or 36 percent of the total student population. This steady enrollment figure is the culmination of five years of unprecedented growth in student population for the college: Since 2007, GCC's enrollment has increased by a total of 41

percent!

"We are proud that our students continue to show faith in GCC's ability to provide them with the education and skills they need to be competitive in today's increasingly technological workforce," said Dr. Mary Okada, GCC President. "We feel that with the addition of our new and updated facilities and programs, and our successful reaffirmation of accreditation this summer, we are providing them with an institution they can be proud to attend." Students are also maintaining a steady course load, taking an average number of 3.32 courses this semester, which is virtually the same number (3.31) that they took in Fall 2011.

#### **USDA TOUR OF FOUNDATION BUILDING**

"I his project supports President Obama's initiatives for job creation, sustainability, and education," said USDA Hawaii State Director Chris Kanazawa after his tour of the renovated Foundation Building with President Okada and USDA Area II Guam Director Joe Diego on Sept. 12. "Plus, it's a beautiful building," Kanazawa said.

USDA loaned GCC \$3.5 million for the renovations. The Foundation Building originally opened in 1991 and housed the College library and classrooms. A new LEED-certified Learning Resource Center replaced the old library in December 2011, and the newly renovated Foundation Building, which is also slated for LEED certification, opens Nov. 5.

#### **GCC RECEIVES NRA GRANT**

In an effort to make the GCC Firing Range environmentally safe, the College applied for and in September received \$5,000 in range grant funding from the NRA to support the cost of lead reclamation and mitigation. This cost will cover the lead testing, abatement and mitigation of lead needed to protect range users, staff and the public. The entire project cost is estimated to cost \$10,000, and the U.S. EPA has agreed to provide matching funding to the NRA grant to support the project.

### FROM THE ALO'S DESK...

### DR. RAY SOMERA VICE PRESIDENT FOR ACADEMIC AFFAIRS

During the ACCJC public hearing on the Accreditation Standards last September 24 at the Honolulu Community College campus, President Okada, Dr. Gina Tudela, Dr. Clare Camacho, and I represented the College. It was the last of a series of public hearings by the Commission in an attempt to get public input about the 10-year old Standards with which we are now dealing. The revised standards are expected to be released sometime in AY 2013. The feedback we got was that this hearing was the most substantive and most informative of all three hearings held.

Following are excerpts from Pres. Okada's testimony before the Commission, prepared for her by the Standard chairs and myself:

With regard to suggested changes to the accreditation standards and process, GCC recommends that the concept of serving learning or civic engagement be added to existing standards. Institutions should play a role in inculcating civic citizenship and social consciousness in the young students they serve so that they can later play a role in building their communities as productive citizens. Also, the accreditation process should seek more representation of faculty from Pacific Colleges on evaluation teams. When a faculty



member participates as a member of an accreditation team, the member's College reaps great benefits with regard to its own preparation for accreditation, as many Colleges utilize faculty members as key personnel in the self-evaluation and writing of the report.

When visiting team members receive a concern during a site visit, they should investigate the accuracy or validity of the concern prior to including it in the final report. The CEO must be thoroughly briefed about this concern so that, if necessary and appropriate, the CEO can point the team to certain evidence that needs to be explored further.

Consider incentivizing colleges that successfully address all the recommendations by the midyear report by giving the college an additional two (2) or four (4) more years, if they validate the college's success at midpoint. Total years of reaffirmation would therefore become 8 or 10 years, instead of the usual 6.

## PROJECTHATSA COMPLETERS

20 people completed the initial cohort of Project HATSA (Helping Achieve TANF Success through Actions), a federally funded grant project conducted by GCC and DPHSS. Project HATSA's goal is to build skills necessary for TANF recipients to increase their marketability, namely in the construction trades industry. The mostly female participants first completed a soft skills work readiness workshop, and then learned basic construction skills, heavy equipment operation, and blueprint reading. Finally, participants completed 120 hours of internship with licensed contractors in order to utilize their new skills. At least two of the participants were hired with the companies at which they interned!

# ACCOUNTING STUDENTS ASSIST GIRL SCOUTS



## SUMMER WORK EXPERIENCE REPORT

The 2012 GCC CTE High School Summer Work Experience program had a total of 152 participants, with 132 completers (87% completion rate). Eight out of ten CTE programs were represented in the program, and 38 companies participated. The top training sites (employers) were City Hill (Guam Plaza, JP Superstore, Tarza) – 20 trainees; Hyatt Regency Guam – 17 trainees; and Westin Resort Guam – 14 trainees.
